Not to be defeated, with careful planning and a number of wonderful volunteers, Hurworth held their first virtual craft and produce show. The standard of the crafts

The Council have supported many excellent and worthy causes in the village including HACSA, the Hurworth Junior Football Club, the Hurworth Detached Project and the Covid-19 Support group started by Liv Baker.

The Council have also provided financial support to the Grange to ensure important repairs can be carried out sooner rather than later, helping to finish the kitchen area and completion of the Petanque court extension allowing more people to access this popular pastime.

Great efforts have been made to improve the Parish Council website and it is now a great source of village updates including photos of past events, upcoming events, general information, and just in case you are unable to attend the meetings, minutes of the council meetings. Their final competition to find the oldest resident in the village led on to 48 afternoon teas been made and delivered to our over 85's. They had over 20 bakers, iam makers and sandwich makers to help bring this lovely event together.





FUNDRAISING

A raffle for carers saw a celebration of front line workers who live in the village, in the form of carer packages as well as raising money for St. Teresa's Hospice, working with hospice staff and their supporters in the village. Liv Baker went above and beyond in shaving her head and in total, all activities raised a staggering £5502 for the Hospice. A fantastic effort, but sad to watch!

HURWORTH SEWERS AND CRAFTERS

This group of over 30 sewers worked relentlessly in the early stages of the first lock down to make uniform bags for front line workers and made 1533 in total, but this also became a community effort with donations of bedding, thank you notes, and stickers.

In addition, this group began making pairs of knitted, sewn or crocheted hearts. One was given to COVID patients and one given to their family to bridge the emotional gap whilst not being able to see their loved ones. These continue to be provided to hospitals now, being used for many more departments than those affected by COVID and to date 1278 hearts have been made and delivered.

Sewers also made face coverings to support the local pharmacy who agreed to sell these whilst also collecting for Darlington MIND. The sewers donated 100s of masks and Carole Tunstall who is the village pharmacist, a very



proficient face covering sewer herself, handed over £1000 to Mind, which is just amazing.

The group are now also supporting the Royal British Legion Poppy appeal and are selling knitted and crocheted Poppies to support the amazing charity, who are devastated that current restrictions mean they simply cannot be as visible in the communities as they would like.

VE DAY 75TH ANNIVERSARY

The 'virtual village bake off' was held and saw young and old alike together to raise money, and all received a certificate with winners receiving a rosette.

BREAST CANCER NOW

A raffle to win afternoon teas for two, was held together with a cake sale £560 was raised

MACMILLAN COFFEE MORNING

This saw hundreds of villagers come together to bake, sell and buy goodies as well as providing a special sit in tea for some of the more senior villagers. £1200 was raised for Macmillan.



HURWORTH HALLOWEEN TRAIL

This was the most recent event to go live and over 170 children and 56 houses were signed up to for a socially distanced Halloween trail, with all of the sweets donated to maintain social distancing.

CHRISTMAS CRAFTS

A number of socially distanced educational classes have also been arranged including wreath making and willow crafts.

ENGAGING THE COMMUNITY

In order to support all of this work, Liv and Tracie have set up a community email address, a Facebook page and they are developing the community centre website to ensure messages are focussed, fun, accurate and consistent. All available platforms have been used amazingly to support the village events arranged by them both.

Both Liv Baker and Tracie Jacobs have now joined the Grange Management Committee.

During these strange times EPICH members have carried on with our projects, but always taking into account any restrictions.

The Wildflower Meadow

It is with great reluctance that we have decided to abandon the perennial wildflower meadow at The Grange. Unfortunately. because of the balance of the original seed mix, perennial knapweed has taken over and out competed many of the other species. This has meant that we haven't been able to achieve the seasonal spread of the different flowers we had hoped for. The woody nature of the stems of the knapweed made it a difficult job for EPICH volunteers to strim and rake. In future the meadow will be cut along with the other grass areas by DBC. However, the spring bulbs we planted last autumn will still bloom before the first grass cut - rabbits permitting! We are hoping to find smaller areas in the village which we can sow with wildflowers and maintain in a much more manageable way.

Lychgate Orchard

EPICH volunteers have put in a lot effort to tidy up this neglected area and turn it into a wildlife corridor within the village. We will be leaving part of the natural vegetation but also putting in wildflower plants and putting up bird and bat boxes during the autumn. Hedgehog and insect friendly habitat piles have already been created and hedgehogs are seen regularly in this area. We are hoping

to have Hurworth registered and recognised as a "Hedgehog Friendly" village so watch out for updates on Hurworth Live as to how you and your garden can be involved.

Interpretation panels

EPICH has been awarded a grant of £2000 by Tees Valley Nature Partnership (TVNP) to enable us to commission illustrated interpretation panels at locations in the village. Work is already under way for the first one, which will be in Lychgate Orchard explaining the area and the wildlife. We also hope to commission one for The Heritage Orchard at The Grange explaining and identifying our Fruit Trees

The Village Bees at Clervaux

The summer honey from our bees has been for sale at Rockliffe Pharmacy. Profits from the sale of the spring and summer honey goes back into projects for the village.

We are taking eight hives into the winter and will be feeding the bees regularly to replace their honey stores (pictured).

Recent work.

Most recently EPICH Volunteers strimmed and cleared the verges of Coach Lane (pictured) with a view to sowing annual wildflowers along the lane in the Spring.

Also in October is our annual bulb planting; around 2000 spring bulbs for the area around the entrance to the Primary School at Westfield Drive.





National Nest Box Week - February 2021

We hope to repeat our Bird Box Giveaway next year, 2021. Last February, during National Bird Box Week, we gave away 35 bird boxes; we would love to hear from you about any success stories you had and the types of birds who moved in.

If you didn't have any lodgers, don't worry, it sometimes takes a year or two before the boxes are occupied but just check that you've put it on a north or east facing wall.



TRAFFIC REPORT JANUARY TO SEPTEMBER

Traffic monitoring continued to take place as we moved into the Covid-19 lockdown situation. During this period Hurworth Road continued to be the worst location for speeding. As can be seen from the first chart there was a sharp decrease in traffic volume as the situation developed from March onwards.

Monthly Traffic Volume Hurworth Road





The April traffic volume had fallen to 35% of what it was in January and 33.5% of the February volume. However, as the quantity of traffic decreased, the speed at which it was travelling increased. Durham Constabulary reported that the situation was being repeated across the whole of the Borough.

The 85th Percentile figure is a good indicator of the traffic speed in an area. One definition of the 85th percentile speed is, "the speed at or below which 85 percent of all vehicles are observed to travel under free-flowing conditions past a monitored point." An 85th percentile figure of 32 M.P.H. means that 85% of traffic is travelling at or below 32 M.P.H. Darlington Highways Dept. regard an 85th percentile figure of 35 M.P.H. (in a 30 M.P.H. zone) as a major cause for concern. The chart below shows monthly 85th percentile figures for Hurworth Road:

Monthly 85th Percentiles Hurworth Road



The April figure of 35.9 M.P.H. is the worst we have ever recorded, 15% of vehicles were travelling at over 35.9 M.P.H (4018 total). The September 85th percentile for The Green was 31.3 M.P.H and Metal Bridge (Otter & Fish) 30.0 M.P.H. The Parish Council have recently received complaints about speeding from residents of The Green, and Roundhill Road.

We currently have three speed monitors which can be deployed in five locations. In response to the increasing concerns over traffic speeds within the village, the Council has decided to invest in two new speed monitors. These are able to record at 30 or 20 M.P.H. speed limits and will enable us to monitor the new 20 M.P.H. limit which we hope will in place early next year. With five devices in fixed locations we will be able to improve the targeting of speed watch activity within the village, as well as having a full set of data from each location which can be passed on to Durham Constabulary.



SPEEDWATCH

The Speedwatch team is pleased to welcome two new members to the group. We continue to go out regularly and continue to have a good relationship with our Police Neighbourhood team. As a result of our teams hard work the Police have identified the areas of concern and have been out with the speed gun on several occasions.

We are always looking for more volunteers so if you have an hour to spare please get in touch with the Parish Council Office. Full training will be given
